Sponsor clubs screen and select applicants January - April 2012

Applications due to sponsoring Rotary Club April 1, 2012 – in addition to the online application, a University transcript, a photo and 2 letters of recommendation must be submitted.

Applications due to District Scholarship Committee June 1, 2012

Coach and prepare applicant for District Interview June - July 2012

Reception and District Interviews July 27th and 28th, 2012

Recommended Proposals submitted by Sponsor and Host Districts online to Rotary Foundation October 2012

Applications opened for 6 months online once Proposal is approved by TRF

Zone Training January 2013

Host and Sponsor Districts submit applications online to TRF April 2013 for approval on July 1, 2013. These dates may change.

FOUNDATION AMBASSADORIAL Global Grant SCHOLARSHIP

Rotary Foundation Global Grants can be used to fund scholarships with sustainable, high-impact outcomes in one of Rotary's six [areas of focus](#): peace and conflict prevention/resolution, disease prevention and treatment, water and sanitation, maternal and child health, basic education and literacy, economic and community development.

AMBASSADORIAL Global Grant SCHOLARSHIPS are for study during **one academic year abroad** and provide funding by a cash grant of \$tba from which the applicant must provide for round-trip transportation, tuition and fees, room, board and language training (if necessary) and living expenses.

TERMS OF SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholars are required to attend at least one orientation seminar if offered in their district or region. Orientation seminars include training on developing and delivering speeches and presentations.

Study or training must be undertaken in another country or territory where there are Rotary clubs. It cannot take place in the country of the sponsor Rotary district.

Although applicants are asked to list their preferred study locations, the Foundation Trustees reserve the right to make assignments to any suitable institution to ensure the widest possible geographical distribution of scholars. Candidates must be flexible in their study institution assignments.

Scholars will not be assigned to a city, state or province where they have lived or studied for more than twelve months. As a result, these scholarships are not appropriate for students seeking to continue their studies at a given university.

Each scholar is responsible for applying directly to the assigned institution, gaining admission, obtaining required visas, and making travel arrangements. The scholarship may not be used in conjunction with a study-abroad program affiliated with a home-country institution.

Scholars must locate funds to cover all expenses that are not specifically financed by their scholarship or for which their scholarship is not sufficient. Scholarships will not be increased to cover spouses, dependents, or anyone other than the scholar.

Scholars may receive additional funding from other sources during the scholarship period, but, the Foundation will not duplicate funds provided by these sources.

Depending on tax laws in the home and host countries, the scholarships may be partially or fully taxable. It is the scholar's responsibility to investigate tax regulations for scholarship funding.

Ambassadorial Scholarships must be used in the Six Areas of Focus. Scholars planning to pursue medical studies are not permitted to engage in hands-on procedures or direct-care patient services during the scholarship period.

Any applicant whose native language is not that of the proposed country of study must submit evidence of the ability to read, write and speak the language of that country.

Candidates must also pass a language proficiency exam determined by the Foundation
